Museum Reopens with New Exhibit—Luzerne County Decides



Following closure for several months due to building issues, the Society is pleased to announce the reopening of its Museum on **June 1st**. In addition to Saturday hours 11:00-3:00, members (no charge) and the general public (\$3-\$5) may schedule a Museum visit Tuesday through Friday by calling the Society in advance 570-823-6244 x 3.

To celebrate the reopening, a new exhibit entitled *Luzerne County De-*

cides will be unveiled at a public reception to be held 5:00 – 7:00 on Friday, May 31st. Featuring buttons, ribbons, pins, pictures, and signs, "Luzerne County Decides" looks back on elections at the local, state, and national levels, from 1836 – 2016. We hope you can join us.

Gilded Age Tour at Wilkes University

On **Sunday, June 30th, 11:00-3:00**, the Society will conduct a Gilded Age Tour of five historic homes located on the campus of Wilkes University, Wilkes-Barre. The homes include: Rifkin Hall (1875); Conyngham Hall (1897); Weckesser Hall (1914-1916); Kirby Hall (1873-1874); and Chase Hall (1917-1918). Each has their own unique history and stories associated with former owners and families. Please note that Rifkin Hall and Kirby Hall are not ADA compliant. Parking will be available and accessed in the lot off South Franklin Street behind the Henry Student Center (84 West South Street), where participants will register, get a tour map, and visit the homes in whatever order they like. Society volunteers at each location will detail the history and significance of each house. No reservations are necessary but encouraged and tickets are \$10 for members and \$15 for non-members.


Found in Collection

Maria Fuller Rice (MFR)

A collection of curious materials found in our archives are seven bound volumes of historically themed papers, written between the years 1884-1909 by Maria Fuller Rice but simply referred to as MFR (1844-1909). She was the daughter of Congressman Henry Mills Fuller and Harriet Tharpe, and married PA Superior Court Judge Charles Edmund Rice in 1873.

Maria Rice had membership in multiple social clubs and historical organizations, such as Daughters of the American Revolution, the Mayflower Society, and the Thursday Club (a group of prominent local women interested in civic affairs). Many of these clubs would come up with a theme for the year, and each member would basically research and write a report on topics fitting the theme, to be read at their meetings. The papers are generally of a historic nature, and a few are about local history. At least one of her papers was read before the Wyoming Historical and Geological Society, the former name of our Historical Society.



The papers span the years 1884-1909 and were gathered and bound together into books by either her husband, Charles, or son, Charles Jr., in 1910, the year after she died. Handwritten, most of the pages are written on stationary emblazoned at the top with "The Superior Court of Pennsylvania, Judges' Chambers." According to her obituary, Mrs.

Rice would faithfully accompany her husband to various cities whenever the Superior Court was in session, so perhaps some of these papers were written while she waited for him.

The Charles Edmond Rice family lived on South Franklin Street in Wilkes-Barre, and were buried in Hollenback Cemetery, along with their sons and Maria's parents.

Mr. Hobo Hat Pop-Up Exhibit



Our first pop-up exhibit featured Wilkes-Barre's and the Society's arguably most famous world traveler, Mr. Hobo Hat. Having left Wilkes-Barre in 1922 and traveling via trains, steamships, automobiles, and even rickshaws over 100,000 miles in multiple trips around the world, the hat returned home some years later and was loaned and later donated to the Society in 1959. He traveled to the offices of Visit Luzerne County in April (shown in the photo to the left), the Abide Coffeehouse in May, and will conclude its journey at the Osterhout Library during June before returning safe and sound to the Society in early July.

146th Commemoration of the Battle of Wyoming at the Wyoming Monument

Although not an event sponsored by the Historical Society, it has long been a supporter and promoter of the annual commemoration of the Battle of Wyoming at the Wyoming Monument held on July 4th., 10:00-Noon. Following the ceremony, the Society and the 24th Connecticut Militia Regiment will host a re-enactment of the Battle's capitulation at 1:00 pm at the Nathan Denison House in Forty Fort. Denison House will also be open to visitors from Noon-3:00. Admission is free for everyone. Shown to the right is the iconic table said to be the very one upon which the capitulation was signed. Early Settlement Along the "Great Road"

The Society is the recipient of a \$5,000 grant from The Luzerne Foundation to provide homeschool and scouting youth (boys and girls) residing in Luzerne County with a unique, educational, and entertaining program entitled *Early Settlement Along the "Great Road"*. Free of charge, this program focuses on explaining, via oral narratives, site visits, and materials, over a half-day experience, the details of two historical events (the Yankee-Pennamite Wars and the Battle of Wyoming) and the importance of two families (Denison and Swetland) to our local history along what was once called the "Great Road", today's Wyoming Avenue. Filmed in and around Wilkes-Barre, it tells the story of the murder of Mrs. Haynes, resident of the old Armory homestead, followed by an ever increasing intensity of the struggle for possession of the Amory code, in which lies the secret of the Amory fortune.
