Recent Donations Help LCHS Make Progress on Its Strategic Plan Goals

In our last issue, we shared the goals of our 2018-2021 strategic plan:

We were proud to have Mark Riccetti attend as a conference scholarship winner. "It was nice to be able to hang out with likeminded professionals," Mark said. "I also enjoyed visiting the College Park Aviation Museum and seeing how they displayed their collection."
- Executive Director Aimee Newell attended the **Building Museums** conference, organized by the Mid-Atlantic Association of Museums, in Brooklyn in late February. As LCHS plans for its own combined library and museum building, the conference sessions

offered food for thought about best practices, all

of the steps involved in a building (or renovating) project and the unknowns that might pop up partway through.

• In April, Director of Operations and Programs Mark Riccetti Jr., Museum Manager Allyson Earl and Executive Director Aimee Newell attended the **PA Museums** conference put on by the Pennsylvania Federation of Museums and Historical Places in Chadds Ford. "I am inspired to include more interactive elements at our museum—perhaps having a typewriter and a rotary phone for kids to touch—we have ones that relate to local history—and some reproduction Native American beading and arrows so visitors can see how they feel," Allyson said.

New to the LCHS Collection!

Portrait of Frank English, President of Planters Nut & Chocolate Company by Mark Riccetti Jr., Director of Operations & Programs

The month of May means two things in the Wyoming Valley: spring turns into summer, and the Fine Arts Fiesta takes place on Public Square. This inspired us to take a closer look at one of the newest acquisitions to our collection—a portrait of Frank English (1896-1959). English was a longtime employee of the Planters Nut and Chocolate Company who, after four decades with the company, became its president in 1956, serving until his passing in 1959.

During his term as president, the company, originally founded by Amedeo Obici in 1906, occupied its world headquarters at 632 South Main Street (see one of the fence posts from the building below, now in the LCHS collection), as well as a retail store on Wilkes-



Barre's Public Square.
Famously filling the Square with the smell of



freshly roasted peanuts, the store would dispatch a nearly eight-foot-tall Mr. Peanut to greet visitors and hand out small bags of peanuts.

The portrait, which was donated to the Society by Marianne Horrigan, was painted by Italian-American artist Niccolo Cortiglia (1896-1982). Cortiglia was primarily a portrait artist who studied at the Royal Academy in Florence Italy, before emigrating to America and setting up a studio in New York City. However, by the 1950s, Cortiglia was living in Noxen, Pennsylvania, and set up an art school in Wilkes-Barre. In addition to teaching, Cortiglia made a living painting portraits of famous Valley residents such as Frank English and Admiral Howard Stark, whose portrait hung in the ballroom of the Hotel Sterling. He received an honorary degree from King's College in 1977. A collection of his papers and works currently resides in the Smithsonian's Archives of American Art.
